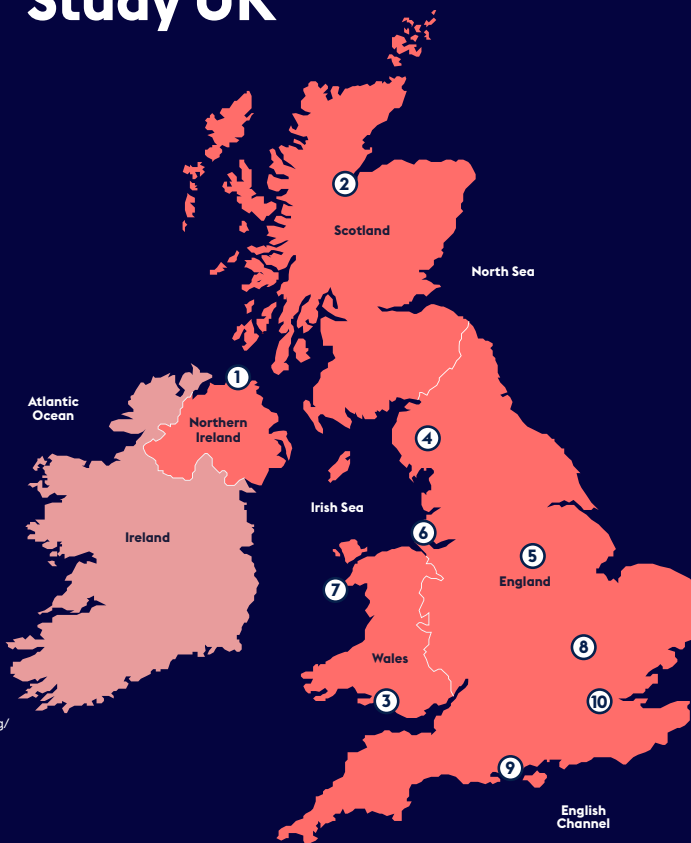

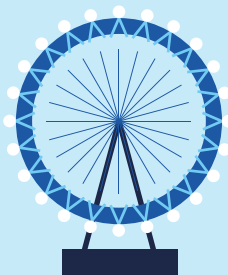

Undergraduate studies

For international undergraduates looking to kick-start their career, the UK offers far more than just a world-class education. With a wide range of learning experiences around every corner, you will graduate with the confidence, skills and knowledge to shape your future.

UK undergraduate course types include:

Bachelor's or undergraduate degree: BA (Bachelor of Arts), BSc (Bachelor of Science), BEd (Bachelor of Education) and BEng (Bachelor of Engineering). A full-time bachelor's degree normally takes three years to complete (four in some cases). Part-time options are also available at some universities and colleges.

Shorter courses: Foundation Degree, Diploma of Higher Education, Higher National Diploma, and Certificate of Higher Education.

Postgraduate studies

With our exceptional academic standards, progressive teaching techniques and globally respected research practices, it's easy to see why so many international postgraduates choose to study in the UK.

The UK is world renowned for its academic excellence and is the global leader in [quality of research](#). What's more, many UK master's degree programmes can be completed in just one year, offering great value for money and allowing you to move on with your career more quickly.

Studying for a postgraduate degree in the UK can transform your career.

Master's degrees

A master's degree is a second-level qualification, which is almost always completed on the basis that you have completed an undergraduate degree.

If studying for a master's related to your undergraduate degree subject, you will be able to gain a deeper knowledge and level of understanding in that field. Some people, though, opt to go in a completely different direction and move into a field that they haven't studied - or formally studied - before. If you are planning on studying something vastly different from your undergraduate studies, check what the requirements are on individual university websites, or speak with their admissions teams.

There are two main types of master's degrees: taught and research.

Some common master's degrees include:

- MA (Master of Arts) in a wide range of arts or humanities subjects.
- MSc (Master of Science).
- A range of subject-specific qualifications including MEng (Master of Engineering), MFA (Master of Fine Arts), LLM (Master of Laws), MArch (Master of Architecture), and more.
- Courses leading to an MPhil (Master of Philosophy) qualification are research-led and often designed for students to progress to a PhD.

Note that some Scottish universities offer an undergraduate degree called a Scottish Masters of Arts which is completed over three or four years. This shouldn't be confused with a postgraduate master's.



MBA courses

Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree is an internationally recognised qualification which gives you the skills you need for a successful management career.

PhDs or doctorates

A Doctor of Philosophy, or doctorate (PhD/DPhil), is the highest academic level a student can achieve. These degrees are very demanding and often lead to careers in academia (as a lecturer or researcher, for example). Most students will complete a master's degree before progressing to a PhD, although this isn't always necessary - especially within scientific subjects.

Postgraduate diplomas and qualifications

Postgraduate certificates and diplomas allow students to study something new or build on the skills and knowledge they have already gained during their undergraduate degrees. They are usually shorter than a master's and do not require you to prepare a thesis or dissertation.

Professional and vocational qualifications

These qualifications help you improve or gain skills for specific jobs. Most awards involve practical training. This gives you the opportunity to experience a job first-hand.

Conversion courses

A conversion course is a vocational postgraduate qualification usually taken by graduates who want to change their subject area following on from their first degree. Often students do this to develop more professional skills. For example, you could study history for your undergraduate degree and do a law conversion course to begin your career as a lawyer.

Other options for you

As well as undergraduate and postgraduate study, the UK offers many other opportunities to international students:

Further education:

This refers to education after secondary school that is not an undergraduate or postgraduate degree. Further education institutions in the UK provide technical and professional education and training to people over the age of 16. Qualifications and training include A-Levels, apprenticeships, traineeships, vocational qualifications and entry level training.

Foundation pathway courses:

These are designed for international students to improve their English skills and develop the confidence to start undergraduate or postgraduate study. They provide the opportunity to adjust to the UK's culture and get used to university teaching.

English language courses:

As the home of the English language and with a reputation for academic excellence, the UK is the perfect destination to learn English.

Boarding schools:

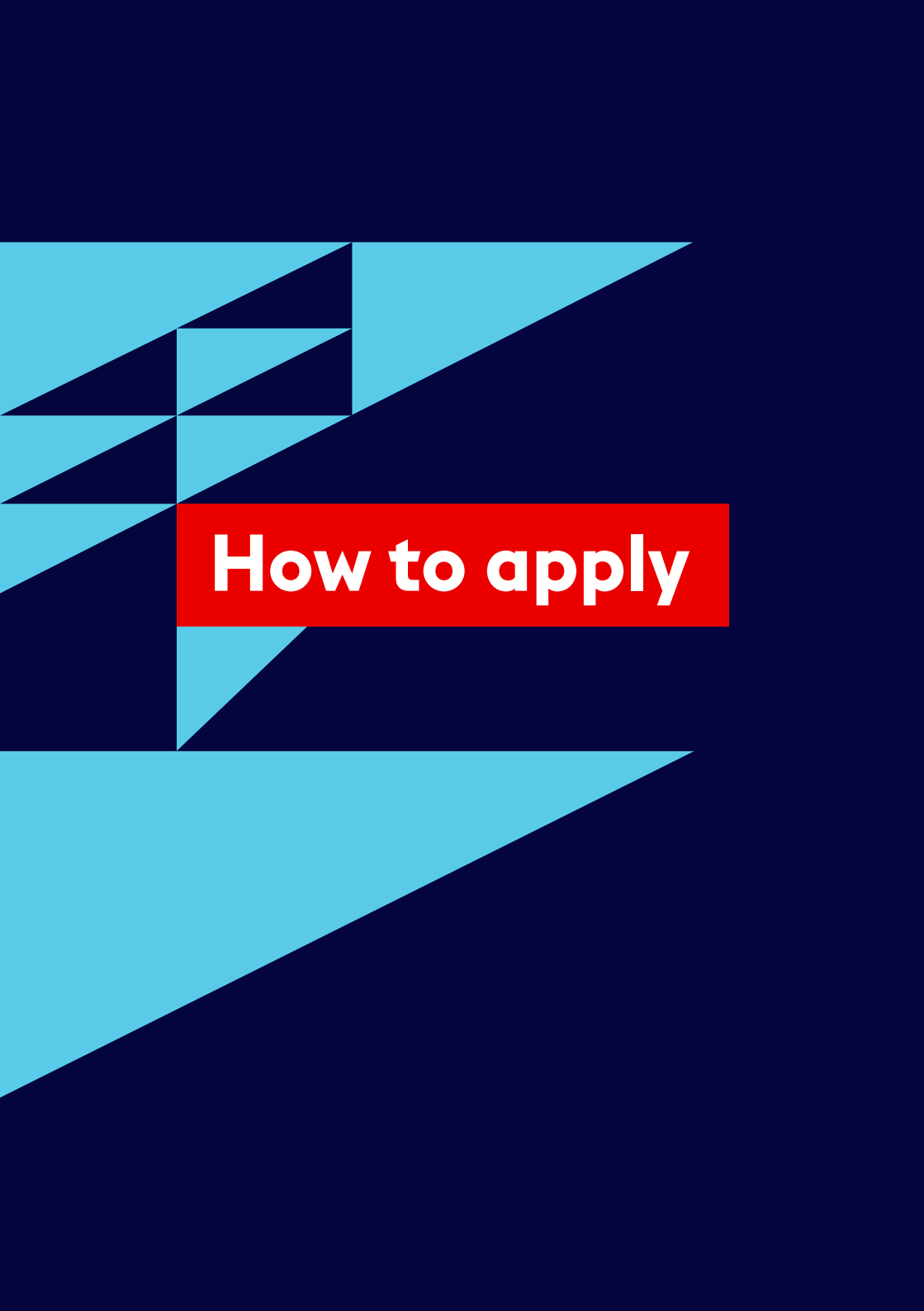
A boarding school is a residential school where pupils live and study during the school year. There are approximately 500 boarding schools across the UK.

How to apply

Undergraduate studies

Apply for undergraduate studies

Most undergraduate applications are made through the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS). To apply through UCAS, go to www.ucas.com to register your details in their system. You can apply for up to five courses through UCAS and you will be contacted with any offers by your chosen universities or colleges.

Application deadlines

Mid October

For courses at the University of Oxford and the University of Cambridge and for most courses in medicine, veterinary medicine, science and dentistry.

End of January

For most undergraduate courses.

30 June

Late deadline for most undergraduate courses. Applications received after this deadline will automatically go into “clearing”, so you will not be guaranteed your first choice.

While you will be able to apply after the January deadline right up until 30 June, it is better to apply early.

What is Clearing?

Clearing is how universities and colleges in the UK fill any places they still have on their courses. From early July to mid October, you can apply for a course using Clearing if you're not already holding an offer from a university or college, and the course still has places.

You can use Clearing if:

- You're applying after 30 June.
- You didn't receive any offers (or none you wanted to accept).
- You didn't meet the conditions of their offers.
- You've paid the multiple choice application fee.
- You've declined your firm place using the 'decline my place' button in your application.

Useful tips for applying through Clearing:

- Ask for advice from your teachers and counsellors.
- See what courses are available by using the search tool on UCAS and check entry requirements.
- Consider different courses of subjects.
- Directly contact universities or colleges you're interested in.
- Add your Clearing choice in your application.

Postgraduate studies

Many UK universities handle their own postgraduate applications and you can often apply directly through their websites.

Many postgraduate courses do not have fixed application deadlines. However, it is always best to apply early to make sure you have the best chance of being accepted – ideally, six months to a year before your course of choice begins.

What you will need when applying to UK universities and colleges

Your qualifications

You can check the equivalence of your country's qualifications with those in the UK by contacting the UK National Information Centre – <https://www.enic.org.uk/>



Personal statement

You will be required to provide a personal statement as part of your application to study at a UK university. This document is your opportunity to explain why you would like to study your chosen subject, and to outline the skills and experience that make you well suited to this field.

Here are some tips:

- The course description on the university website will explain the qualities, skills and experience it requires. Be sure to explain how you match each of these requirements as you write your statement.
- State why you are applying for the course. Be specific about which aspects interest you most, and how you believe the course will help you in your future ambitions.
- As well as explaining why you are academically suited to the course, also describe any work experience you may have – or any extra curricular activities you take part in.

Additional documents and information

While UCAS can send results on your behalf (including the International Baccalaureate) for most international qualifications, you may need to send proof of those results yourself.

You should check with your chosen university, to understand what their policy is on the additional documents and information. You may be required to provide proof in the form of certificates or transcripts.





Student visas

Student visas

Most international students will need a visa to study in the UK. Finding out whether you need a visa to study is easy – simply check the [UK government's website](#) using the QR.



Student visa (previously Tier 4 visa)

It is likely you will need to apply for a student route visa to study in the UK, and you should check with your country's governmental information to confirm this.

It costs £558 per applicant. If you want a priority or super-priority service, it will cost more.

Money, budgeting and scholarships

Money, budgeting and scholarships

Course fees

Fees for UK courses vary depending on your study level and where in the UK you are studying (as there are different rules for England, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales).

International students can expect to pay between £11,400 and £38,000 annually for tuition, with undergraduate degrees typically lasting four years in Scotland and three years in the rest of the UK.

Always be sure to check the cost of course fees with the university or college you are applying to. Most often, this information will be listed the universities' websites.



Living costs

No matter which country you're from, the UK is an affordable study destination. Knowing what kinds of costs you can expect will help you to plan your finances.

The cost of living varies, depending on where in the UK you decide to study. London and other big cities are more expensive than other areas, for example. But depending on where you study you should expect to budget from between £1,500 and £1,700 per month in London and between £1,100 and £1,500 in the rest of the UK per month to cover your rent, bills, entertainment and other living costs.



The institution where you choose to study will be able to advise you on more detailed local costs of living and where to shop locally. 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Scholarships and financial support

There are often funding options available for international students who want to study in the UK. These range from part-funding, for example paying part of your fees, to full-funding which covers programme fees, living expenses, and return flights to the UK.

GREAT Scholarships

GREAT Scholarships are for international students who want to study at a UK university for a one-year postgraduate course. Each scholarship offers a minimum of £10,000 towards tuition fees.

The scholarships are jointly funded by the British Council, the GREAT Britain Campaign, and participating UK higher education institutions.

Living in the UK

Accommodation

Most universities and colleges have their own accommodation office, and this should be the first place you go to ask about accommodation. Most institutions provide accommodation for international students in a hall of residence (either full-board or self-catering) or a self-catering shared house or flat. Space is usually limited, so applications for such accommodation should be made as soon as you have been accepted on your course and certainly before the required deadlines.

Private accommodation

The accommodation office at your institution should be able to help with this, too. The office may keep lists of private accommodation available in the area, and some offices may even help you arrange a booking. Do check in with them for more information.

The most common type of private accommodation is a room in a house with shared facilities. Renting a furnished house or a flat is likely to be expensive, especially in city centres, and can be quite difficult to secure. A good way of making this affordable is to share with other students. If you do this, make sure you agree beforehand on how you will share costs.



Food

Food is often near the top of the list of things we miss when away from home. But food can be one of the best parts of living in the UK. Your time at university offers you a great opportunity to build a positive relationship with food and cooking, to create some interesting, delicious meals and to really enjoy yourself.

On average, a month's food expenses amount to about £155 in London and £116 in the rest of the UK. You'll find a range of supermarkets offering plenty of options to accommodate different student budgets.

An increasing number of UK supermarkets offer international food products, so you will always be able to get together with friends and cook the food you love. By living among people from all backgrounds and cultures, you can also try out new and different cuisines. So why not ask your flat mates for a few tips, and learn to make some quick and easy dishes from different cultures?

Living in catered halls at university typically includes breakfast and dinner from Monday to Friday, with at least some meals provided during the weekend as well, since cooking facilities are often limited. It's advisable to check with your specific accommodation for details.



Leisure time

On campus, the students' union usually organises all kinds of social functions and there will be many clubs and societies that you can join.

If you are interested in arts and culture, you will find the UK packed with museums, theatres and other cultural attractions just waiting to be discovered.

The restaurant scene in the UK is thriving, and increasingly diverse. Pubs are also popular social destinations for many university and college students in the UK. You don't have to drink alcohol to go to a pub – you will find lots of non-alcoholic drinks on offer, and many pubs also have food and entertainment such as karaoke, football match screenings, or pub quizzes (weekly events where you compete as a team).

Some of the world's largest music venues and events are in the UK, such as the O2 Arena in London and the world-famous Glastonbury Festival, but many world-renowned artists and bands also play at UK universities and colleges, and small bars and cafés often host live music and dancing.

Almost every town will have a cinema with films from around the world. Hollywood releases will be easy to find, but major cities also have cinemas specialising in foreign and independent films, and universities often have a student cinema that shows films on campus at student-friendly prices.

If you love sport, the UK offers a range of ways to explore your passion. We're fanatical about every kind of sport here, and many of our athletes and clubs lead the world. Whether it's global team sports, like football, or individual sports like athletics, you will find ways to compete in and celebrate the sports you care most about alongside your studies.



UK weather and clothing

Although UK weather is unpredictable, it is rarely extreme. Wear several layers so that you can put them on or take them off as the weather changes, and always carry an umbrella.

Most UK towns and cities have a large range of shops selling clothes to suit all styles and budgets. You will see all kinds of fashion at UK schools, colleges and universities, and almost anything goes. Students usually dress casually during the day – jeans and t-shirts are fine – and more smartly if you're going out in the evening. Very few student bars and pubs have a dress code.

Some courses require you to wear specialist clothing for health and safety. For example, if you are in a science laboratory, you may need to wear protective glasses and a white lab coat. Some universities will provide these, while others may require you to purchase your own.

The UK is a multi-cultural place and it is common for people to wear clothing associated with their culture and religion, for example a head scarf, kippah, turban, sari or long skirt. In major towns and cities, you will find specialist shops selling clothing from around the world, particularly Asian and Middle Eastern clothing.



Four seasons in the UK

There are various ways to query the weather in the UK. Smartphones come with their own weather query tools. Two authoritative UK weather forecast networks recommended are the Met Office and BBC Weather.

Spring

Spring usually begins at the vernal equinox, around March 20 in the northern hemisphere. The weather in Britain is slightly dry in spring.

Summer

The British summer calendar includes three months in June, July and August, from the day of the summer solstice around June 21. It is also the longest day of the year.

Autumn

Autumn in the UK starts around the autumnal equinox on September 22 and lasts until November. The season is characterized by increasingly cooler temperatures, especially noticeable in the mornings and evenings. As autumn progresses, the weather becomes more unpredictable, with frequent rain and wind in the latter half of the season.

Winter

Winter begins at the winter solstice, around December 22 in the Northern Hemisphere. The winter solstice marks the shortest day of the year, after which the days start to lengthen.

In winter the average is between 2 and 7 degrees Celsius (36–45 degrees Fahrenheit), but temperatures can drop below 0 degrees Celsius (36 degrees Fahrenheit). Most houses, buildings, trains and buses have good heating systems. In general, there is little difference between the regions of the UK, but you will experience more snow, rain and wind in northern and mountainous areas.



Explore the UK

From bustling cities to snow-capped mountains, rolling green hills to highlands and islands, exploring is a must. Its relatively small size and good transport links mean that you can see a lot while you are here. Some highlights include London with its fascinating history, iconic buildings, cutting-edge fashion, theatre and food; northern cities like Manchester and Liverpool, which are well known for their famous football clubs and great nightlife; Scotland's stunning mix of wild beauty and buzzing cities; the stunning landscapes of Wales' national parks; and the spectacular coastline of Northern Ireland.

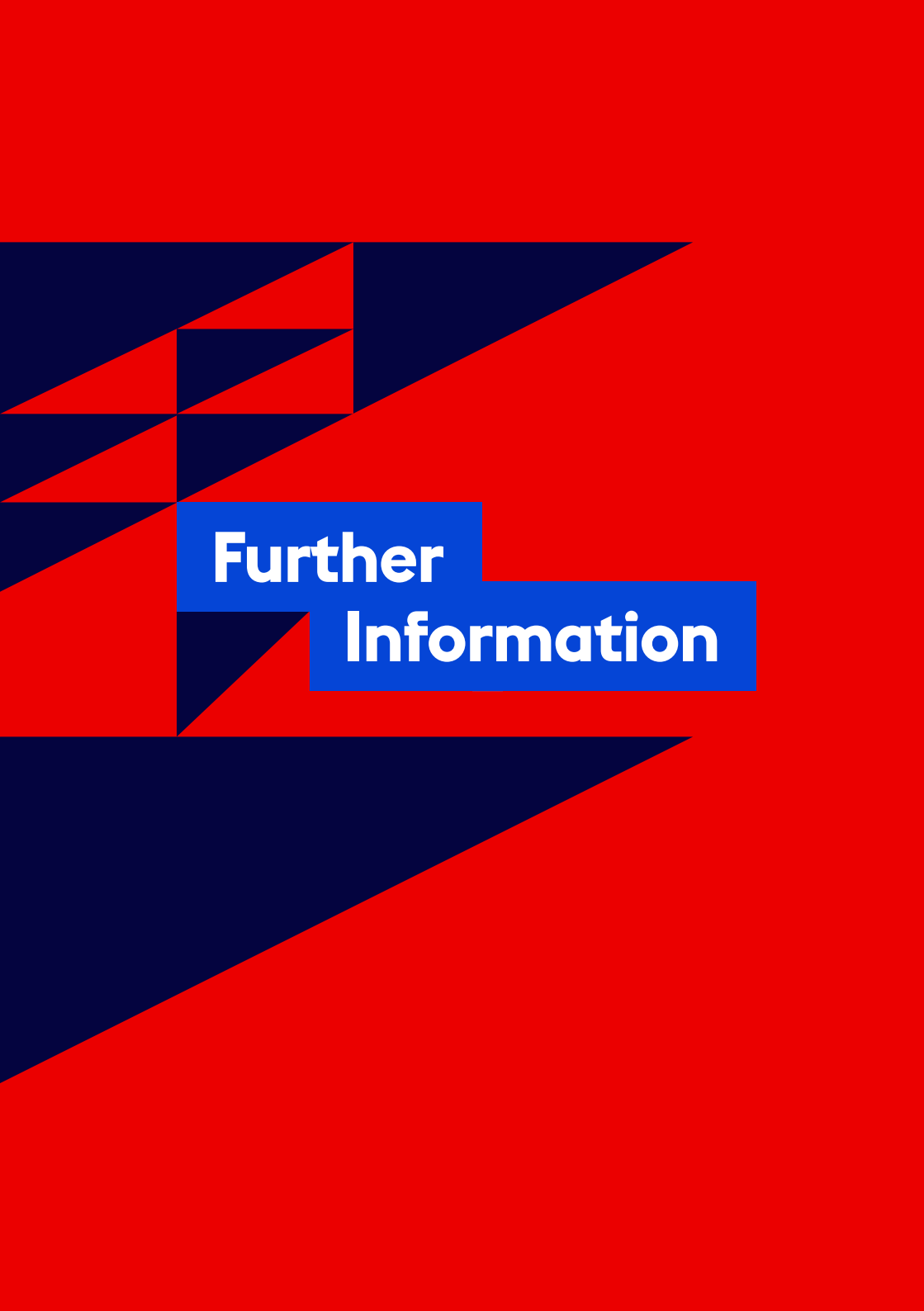


Religion in the UK

As an open, inclusive and multi-faith society, students of all religions can expect to feel welcome in the UK, along with plenty of places to practise their faith. 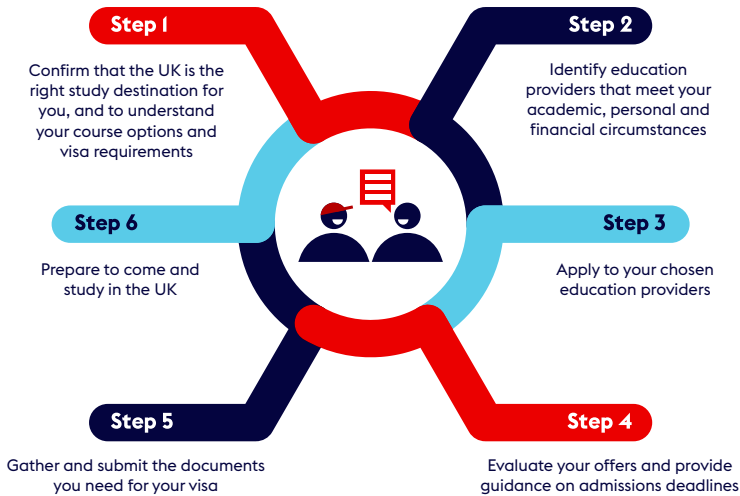

Choosing an international study destination is one of the most important decisions you can make. Your family and friends may be able to help but making a final choice and applying to an education provider can be daunting. This is why many students get help from an education agent or counsellor.

This guide is for you and your family to understand the role of agents working with UK-bound students and the service they should provide.

A good education agent will help you to:



They will have:

What you should expect from your education agent

- A well trained agent will explain the UK education system, the different regions of the UK and the schools/colleges/universities they represent. They should give you a good understanding of the many options open to you in the UK.
- They should know what the national code of ethical practice for UK education agents is and show you a copy. Familiarise yourself with the national code to see how your education agent is doing.
- Many education agents will regularly attend training delivered by their partner education providers, the British Council, and UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI).
- The UK does not require a licence for agents to recruit students to UK universities, colleges or schools but agents operating in your country may require a local licence. Do your research beforehand to find out if this applies in your own country. This may include checking with your government's education department or official agent association websites.
- Agent fees are typically covered by the school/college/university in the form of a commission payment, which covers the agent's operating costs. Regardless of whether the agent is paid a commission or not, they should give you high-quality and unbiased advice.
- Some education agents may charge for additional services. They should be clear with you at the start of the process if they will charge you any fees and what they are for. If you are unsure you may check with the education providers that you plan to apply to.
- Agents cannot provide you with favourable entry requirements, alternative application options, or access to information that differs from a student applying directly. If an agent claims to be able to do this, contact the education providers you are applying to, report it, and seek clarification.

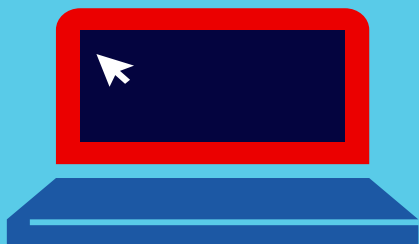


- Agents should have clear information about what you can do if you are not satisfied with the services they have provided you with. If you follow the agent's complaints process but your issue is still not resolved, talk to the education providers you are applying to, and seek their advice.
- If you are not satisfied with the education provider's response, you may be eligible to complain to an ombudsman. In England and Wales, this can be done through the [Office of the Independent Adjudicator](#), in Scotland it is the [Scottish Public Service Ombudsman](#), and in Northern Ireland, it is the [Northern Ireland Public Service Ombudsman](#). You should check with the ombudsman website to see if your complaint is eligible or contact them for further information.
- Many education agents may not be licenced UK immigration advisers but can still provide you with effective guidance with your student visa application. If you receive immigration advice from an agent, make sure you also understand the requirements you need to meet. You can find advice on how to apply and how to protect your immigration status once you are in the UK at [gov.uk](#), [UKCISA](#) and [Study UK](#). You can also seek this support from the institution you will study at.
- You can ask to speak to students the education agent has previously placed in the UK. Speaking to them can be a useful way to find out about their experiences. Remember every student's situation is different so their application or visa processes may differ from yours.
- Some education agents offer additional help after you arrive in the UK, e.g. providing visa updates, accommodation support, etc.

Remember, where and what you study is your decision

Education agents are there to help you make an informed decision. Not to decide for you. Be open to any ideas they may suggest but remain firm about what you want. If you believe that you are not receiving the best service, contact the education providers you are applying to and get them to investigate your complaint. Similarly, if you have had a good experience support other students by recommending them and providing reviews.

Whilst some agents do charge fees for their service, this should be explained clearly from the start. Agents should not hold money or make payments on your behalf. If you are unsure about an agent asking you for money, check with the institution you are applying to see if this is legitimate.



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
